SUBJECT: Content and Record Layout of the March 1962 Combined CPS-OCG File

This file consists of two tapes. The first block of the file is an go-character header block, the first 38 characters reading as follows: 1HDRΔMARCHΔ1962ΔCOMBINEDΔCPS-OCGΔFILE. A tape mark follows the header block, and two tape marks designate the end of the data on each tape. The 7-track tapes are written in RCD, even parity, with 800 bits per inch. The record size is fixed at 480 characters, with a blocking factor of 12.

There are 71,745 records on the file, 20,696 of which are matched CPS-OCG males. Four records contain OCG data, but no CPS data, because the blocks containing that data were unreadable. There are 31,661 households on the file, and each is designated with a serial number (Characters 235-240). Within each household the persons' records are sequenced by line number (Characters 91-92). The data are right justified in their fields with blank (binary zero) fill to the left.

When utilizing fields with limited universes, care should be taken to include only those records which actually make up the universe. Records not in a particular universe may nevertheless contain valid codes. (e.g. - zeroes).

Records in Rotation Groups 4 and 8 were not in the March Income Sample* therefore they do not contain valid income data (Characters 133-162) and are coded "19" in the income range fields (Characters 163-172).

There are a few fields in the CPS portion of the record which contain data that are outside the legal range of codes, or that are inconsistent with other data. Our research has found that several modifications had been made to the CPS file since it was originally created, but apparently additional changes occurred which we cannot determine. The following fields were noted to contain discrepancies:
